

Northern Piecemakers Nametags

This nametag is supposed to represent northern lights. It can be made with a regular backing, or with a pocket on the back. It can be attached with a pin, or put on a cord to hang around your neck.

Finished size - 4" X 4"

Fabric – navy (or dark) – two -7" X 2" - two - 4"X 1" - coloured scraps -7" X 1" - light colour for name - 4 ½ " X 1 ½ "



- backing – 4 ½" X 4 ½ " – OR 4 ½ X 8 ½" if making a pocket

Do a bargello strip with a 2" dark strip on both sides – Best if the coloured section is about 1 ½" wide in total


Make several cuts on different angles, as per the illustration.

Now place the pieces together, overlapping the edges and offsetting the stripes – play with this until you find the best layout.



When you are satisfied with the arrangement, sew the strips together – use a very narrow seam allowance. I made a 3" X 3 1/2" cardboard window with a 1/4" border so I could see what it would look like. Place the window over to find the best angle and cut around the outside. Sew one 1"X 4" strip on each end.

Sew your nameplate fabric on the bottom.



For a **plain backing**, measure a piece of fabric the same size as your nametag. Place the bargello on it, right sides together, and sew along

3 sides, and around both corners, backstitching at both ends. Turn right side out and slipstitch the opening shut.

OR

A **pocket** may be added to the back of the name tag. For this you need a piece of backing fabric 4 ½" by 8 ½". Hem one end. Fold the fabric with the hemmed edge ½" below the other end. Place the bargello piece face down on the hemmed side of the backing. Sew around 3 sides plus the corners as above, and turn.

A pin may be sewn on the back of the nametag, or a cord may be added so it can hang around your neck. If you make the pocket, you need to use a cord.
